What is MIECHV?

The Federally funded, Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program helps states, territories, and tribal entities to develop and implement evidence-based, voluntary home visiting programs to improve the development, health, and well-being of at-risk families with young children.

The MIECHV Program gives at-risk pregnant women and families the necessary resources and skills to raise children who are physically, socially, and emotionally healthy and ready to succeed.


There are 6 Benchmarks:

- 1. Improved maternal and newborn health
- 2. Reduce child injuries, abuse, and neglect
- 3. Improve school readiness and achievement
- 4. Reduce crime or domestic violence
- 5. Improve family economic self-sufficiency
- 6. Improve coordination and referrals for community resources

North Carolina Targets Community Needs

MIECHV Program awardees serve populations in at-risk communities. Awardees tailor their programs to serve populations of need within their state.



North Carolina Performance Highlights

- Depression Screening: 96.4% of caregivers enrolled in home visiting were screened for depression within 3 months of enrollment or within 3 months of delivery
- Postpartum Care: 94.4% of mothers enrolled in home visiting received a postpartum visit with a healthcare provider within 8 weeks of delivery
- Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) Screening: 89.4% of caregivers enrolled in home visiting were screened for IPV within 6 months of enrollment

MIECHV Reauthorization

- Current MIECHV funding will expire September 2022
- Five-year reauthorization to increase MIECHV funding by \$200 million
- Double the tribal set- aside within MIECHV from three to six percent
- Continue to allow virtual home visiting as an approved option for service delivery
- Provide \$150 million in emergency pandemic- related funding

Community-Based Child Abuse Prevention


- Federal funding for primary and secondary child maltreatment prevention,
- Offer home visiting and parent education services that build protective factors.
- Raise public awareness about how to prevent child maltreatment.
- Build capacity of professionals who support and strengthen families.



Family First Prevention Services Act

- Tertiary Prevention that serves families at imminent risk of having children placed out of their homes
- Mental Health, Substance Use Disorder, and In-Home Parenting Evidence Based Programs
- Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse
- NC is using a phased approach, starting with Homebuilders and Parents as Teachers
- Services will be available statewide within 7 Social Services Regions.
- Requires evaluation and/or continuous quality improvement plan

Medicaid Reimbursement

- Requires specific eligibility for service reimbursement
 - Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnostic, and Treatment (EPSDT) may apply
 - Services must be evidence based or other qualified services
- Billable services must be provided by Medicaid enrolled and eligible providers
 - Degree requirements apply



Billing codes procedures and eligibility can be different based on program, county, and PHP!


